In a bay near Almeria in southern Spain will be built the world's first underwater residence for tourists. The hotel will be 40 feet down in the Mediterranean. As all the world has opened to tour operators, the only frontier left is the sea, in whose cool depths light fades, no winds blow, there are no stars. There, even the most bored travelers can recapture their sense of romance, beauty or excitement. A submerged hotel is such a lovely idea.

The hotel will cost 170,000 pounds sterling and will be able to accommodate up to ten people a night. Up until now, only scientists and professional divers have lived under the sea, but soon, for the first time, the public will be able to go down into the darkness. They will have to swim down in diving suits, but at 40 feet there would be no problem with decompression.

The design of the hotel was crucial. Most of the underwater structures used before had been in the shape of a diving bell or submarine. Professional divers could cope with such things, but ordinary people would run the risk of violent claustrophobia. That is why the Austrian architect came up with the idea of making three interconnecting circular structures, 18 feet in diameter, and looking much like flying saucers. They will be cast in concrete and launched from the shore. Towed into position, they will be sunk. A foundation of cast concrete would already be in place on the sea-bed. Towers of steel and wires will attach the hotel structures to this. Once in position, the structures will be pumped dry. The steel towers, made to withstand an uplift pressure of 35 tons, will take the strain.

Cables linking the underwater structures to the shore will provide them with electricity, fresh water, television and air, and also dispose of sewage. Entry will be from underneath, up a ladder; because of the pressure inside, there will be no need for airlocks or doors.

The first structure will include a changing room and a shower area, where the divers will get out of their gear. There will also be a kitchen and a lavatory. The second structure will contain a dining room/lecture theater and sleeping accommodations for eight people. The third structure will contain two suites. Stewards will come down with the ten customers to cook for and to look after them. Television monitors will relay all that goes on to the shore so that conversations and discussions taking place on the sea-bed can be transmitted to the whole world.

For around the hotel, there are plans to build a strange secret garden of plastic shapes, curves, circles, hollows. This will have a dual function: first, to attract fish who may see it as a shelter and hiding place; secondly, to allow guests looking out of reinforced windows to see the teeming marine life.

So far, a diving tower 33 feet deep has been installed for diving instruction. An aquarium has been built, and zoologists from Vienna University are in regular attendance to supervise its stocks. There are storage cupboards full of plastic shapes for the underwater garden, and there is a model of the hotel. All that is needed now is permission from the Spanish Government to start building.

### **Australian Aborigines Take Archaeologists to Court**

There is a battle going on in Australia between Aborigines and archaeologists. The Aborigines say that ancient bones and other artifacts should be reburied. The archaeologists say that to do so would mean the end of archaeology.

Rocky Sainty, president of the Tasmanian Aboriginal Land Council, wants all archaeological excavations in Tasmania stopped. Sainty told The Bulletin: "Aboriginal people know how long we've lived here. We know how we trade. The sites that have been excavated are very significant to us. One wouldn't expect someone to go and dig up graves of the whites at the back of Hobart. Well, we have the same feelings".

Last year, Sainty and the council took two La Trobe University archaeologists to court in an effort to have the excavated material returned. University of Western Australia archaeologists had already returned some excavated material. The artifacts, 17,000 years old, had been dug up in the King River valley. After the material was returned to them, the Aborigines scattered it over the lake "to heal the site".

The La Trobe archaeologists, Jim Allen and Tim Murray, were shocked. They refused to hand over the artifacts they had collected before they had finished their analysis. The courts, however, ordered Allen and Murray to return the material to Tasmania. A truck was needed to transport the 500,000 items.

Allen is angry. "This decision means I will never again excavate on a site in Australia, because it would carry at least the potential problem we've encountered this time. It would be unethical to take any material out of the ground knowing that it could be vandalized in this way somewhere down the track."

His colleague, Tim Murray, believes the irony of the current situation is that the work of archaeologists has given Aborigines a new sense of pride. Murray says, "Archaeologists provide a service both to Aboriginal people and the general Australian public. We found the way of making the whole history of this country meaningful before the arrival of Europeans. If that becomes more and more difficult, then the kind of silence that existed before the exploration of Aboriginal history will return".
